The Hard Work of Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is hard work. Yes, you read that right. It is hard work to be thankful. If you think about it for a bit, being thankful requires that we slow down, look around, and take notice. It means realizing that there is something...anything...to be thankful for. That's seriously hard work in a culture that says you can't stop because you might miss some perpetually greater experience just around the corner. The sad part, is that if we're honest with ourselves and one another, we know this pace can't be maintained and we know it's a kind of opiate meant to distract us and keep us fixated on the belief that all our problems can be solve if we're just good little consumers.

Thanksgiving, in that sense, is counter-cultural. It's the opposite of mindless conception while remaining ignorant to the costs. It's giving thanks for what you've already got, not what you might have, or might need, or might want, but what you've already got – right here and right now. That takes intentionality. It takes focus. It takes discipline. In a skip the dishes culture those three things are really hard to do. It's much easier to just order up whatever you want for supper, whenever you want it, pay you \$3.55 delivery charge, and go about your life without a moments pause and reflection.

Maybe that's part of the reason people seem to have such a hard time accepting the climate crisis. If you accept it's a crisis then you have to do something about it...don't you? Who

says there's a crisis and then keeps doing the exact same things that caused the crisis in the first place? If you're in cardiac crisis you rush to the hospital, probably have surgery, and change your lifestyle. Crisis leads to change. How can we look around and say, "wow! Look at the wonder of creation. I'm so thankful for all that God has entrusted to us" and keep destroying the very thing we're thankful for at an alarming rate? That's like saying my clogged arteries will clean themselves and then being shocked when they don't and we have a heart attack. If we accept the that all of creation is part of God...God's house in that classical sense, then how does the psalmist assertion to "enter God's house with thanksgiving" inform



our actions? If God's house is in crisis what's the change that we're going to make? What's the faith-full Christian response?

This thanksgiving I'm struck by the hundreds of thousands who have taken to the streets imploring our elected leaders and our industry leaders to stop putting campaign donations and yearend bonuses above the needs of our planet. I'm struck by the number of youth who are stepping up and providing real leadership when adults have only created a vacuum of platitude inaction. I'm struck by the number of attacks on Gretta Thunberg and the erosion of the scientific process as leftist extremism by old white guys. With the juxtaposition between the two groups, what's the Christian response?

For me it's making different choices and putting my personal support behind those who are willing to offer real leadership and end the cycle of cynical distraction and populist fearmongering while wallpapering inaction with the complexity of modernity. It's making different choices when I buy groceries and clothing, even coffee. It's turning my thermostat up in summer and down in winter. It's taking seriously the theological premise that all creation belongs to God and we are but its stewards, its caretakers.

This thanksgiving what are you thankful for and how will that thanksgiving translate into action?

Mission & Service: Caring for Families



Our gifts for Mission & Service support work with parents and children on the autism spectrum, like Footprints 4 Autism. With programs located in Pickering and Whitby, Ontario, Footprints strives to provide respite care to as many as

possible.

Having a child diagnosed with autism can be one of the most stressful situations a parent faces. Both the child and parent must learn together how to identify, prepare for, and manage the variety of behaviours that make up the autism spectrum. These might include impaired cognition and communication, social deficits, frequent tantrums, and other challenging behaviours that often lead to physical and emotional exhaustion for all involved. Faced with such overwhelming stress and barriers, many parents of children with autism find themselves unable to cope. Respite care can help ease some of the burden on these families, ensuring that, for a few hours each month, they can enjoy a short but much-needed break from the 24/7 care these children require. The respite also allows parents to pay extra attention to their other children, spend some time together, run errands, or just have some down time

Many children affected by autism spend several hours a week in therapy classes and often do not have a lot of time for social play and to just be. Under the guidance of trained volunteers who are supervised by a trained program consultant, Footprints offers participants social interaction with others in a safe and happy environment.

<u>A Dogs Purpose:</u> a sentimental story about a dog serving his people in each of his reincarnated lives. Nice twist at the end. Makes you sad for kids growing up and lonely people.

<u>Murder Mystery</u>: If you want to laugh, choose this light romantic comedy. <u>Losers:</u> Reasonably well done documentary series about how people deal with losing (mainly at sports) and re-find meaning and purpose in their lives.

<u>The Red Sea Diving Hotel:</u> A exciting true story about rescuing Ethiopian refugees via Somalia in the early 1980's. Very relevant today with Venezuelan refugees set to exceed the 6 million from Syria. Asks Jesus's question about the good Samaritan and who you are in response to another's need.

<u>Billy Graham: An Extraordinary Journey.</u> This worthwhile retrospective is of one of the most influential Christian preachers of the 20th century. Evangelist Billy Graham called billions (!!) to have a relationship with Jesus in his Crusades ministry around the world. He preached

against racial segregation when others weren't, saying God loves every person.



World Day of Prayer

Exciting news – Trinity United Church PG has been chosen to be the host of World Day of Prayer on Friday, March 6, 2020.

Some history around the World Day of Prayer

The origins of World Day of Prayer date back to the 19th century when Christian women of United States and Canada initiated a variety of cooperative activities in support of women's involvement in mission at home and in other parts of the world, and over the years evolved into an ecumenical group.

The World Day of Prayer is an international ecumenical Christian laywomen's initiative. It is run under the motto "Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action," and is celebrated annually in over 170 countries on the first Friday in March. The movement aims to bring together women of various races, cultures and traditions in a yearly common Day of Prayer, as well as in closer fellowship, understanding and action throughout the year.

Every year, worship service focuses on a different country and a specific theme, and the women of the chosen country develop the context and suggested content of the service, with that information fed out to the groups all around the world. Then, on the first Friday of March, in services all over the world that country becomes the focus of prayer and understanding. Through preparation and participation in the worship service, women worldwide learn how their sisters of other countries, languages and cultures understand the biblical passages in their context. They learn of the concerns and needs of those women and to empathize and feel in solidarity with them.

The Prince George story

In Prince George, there are 6 denominations with 9 churches that are the key to the presentation: Sacred Heart Catholic, Grace Anglican, St. Michael's Anglican, Our Saviours Lutheran, St. Giles Presbyterian, St. Mary's Catholic, Immaculate Conception Catholic, Trinity United (previously under Knox United Church congregation) and Salvation Army.

The World Wide Day of Prayer, Prince George committee is comprised of representatives from each of these churches. In Prince George, the 7 denominations have taken turns hosting the World Day of Prayer service since 2003 and as indicated in the heading, Trinity United has been chosen as host church for March 2020. And as hosts, Trinity United Church representatives are automatically chairs of the committee for that particular year.

Here at Trinity United PG

Trinity representatives/committee chairs are Pam Boulding who has been involved with WDoP for several years, and Marion Bartlett, a somewhat beginner to the cause. They are both excited about the 2020 country of choice – Zimbabwe, and have already been reaching

out into the community to begin learning more about the country as a whole so as to be prepared to do the best possible to represent them well in our service. We are still awaiting our package with all the details, and will keep everyone informed as we move forward.

As the host church, there are certain expectations, such as –use of the sanctuary, some participation from various persons/committees/groups to help ensure its success, ie: door greeters, participants in the service, projection and live streaming assistance, and possibly more. As we finalize details, we will keep everyone informed, and once we know what assistance is needed, will reach out for volunteers to assist.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee reported financial information for the first eight months of this fiscal year to the Official Board on September 17. Not surprisingly, as Trinity United Church, Prince George, we find ourselves in a similar circumstance as at the end of August last year. **Expenses have exceeded Revenue**. Specifically, expenses have exceeded revenue by \$14,600.

If Trinity is to break even for its 2019 year by the end of December, then revenue will need to exceed expenses by nearly \$15,000 in the next four months. This can be achieved by increasing revenues from Regular Offerings and reducing our operating expenses. Over the full year the budget calls for \$157,500 of revenue from offerings. To August 31, \$91,000 has been offered which represents an average of \$11,375 per month. If we accept the challenge of increasing offerings alone to meet the 2019 budget, for the remaining four months of 2019 the average offerings will need to be \$16,625 per month. This means collectively \$5,250 per month more in offerings. Some expenses may be less than the prior year from now to December, but the challenge in front of the congregation is clearly significant.

For the most part, during 2019, we have realized efficiencies in operating as Trinity PG, and this is reflected in lower overall expenses to date. Our biggest expense remains for salaries and related benefits and for the first eight months, those expenses are on budget. Most other expenses are at or below budget. A portion of the roof at Trinity Downtown has been repaired with funding provided by the Capital Reserve.

Mission and Service offerin

gs have fallen a bit behind the same period in 2018. To the end of August \$13,700 has been offered compared to \$14,900 for the same eight months last year. A target of \$20,000 was set at the Annual Congregational Meeting held in February, and that target is within reach.

A year ago, there was a specific concern about financial support for the Soup Kitchen. That concern is less this year. Expenses to date are about the same as last year, and there are enough funds on hand to continue the Soup Kitchen's outreach for the remainder of the year.

Interim statements of offerings to August 31 have been sent by e-mail. If you have not received an interim statement, please contact the church office. This is a good time to review your offerings to date given the financial challenge ahead for the remaining four months of 2019. If you are new to the congregation and would like to receive offering envelopes or participate in the PAR program, please contact the church office. The PAR program (Pre-Authorized Remittance) is a convenient way to ensure that your support of Trinity United Church is up to date.

The Finance Committee meets monthly throughout the year. If you have any questions, please contact any of the committee members – Nancy Buchanan, Katherine Cruwys, Doug Hofstede, Jim Reid, or me. Thanks, as always to Trish Appleton for her assistance with the work of the Finance Committee.
