



MINISTER'S MESSAGE—REV. BOB

I'm thankful, yet it can be hard sometimes. Not so much to find the words or the time to pause and reflect on one of the glimmer moments of life, offering praise to the Source of all that is. That, I can do. In one sense it is what I was trained and educated to do. I'd be lying if I didn't say it's something that tends to come naturally even before my years of formal education. I tend to be a "glass half full" kind of person. Silver linings are kinda my thing. Lemonade is one of my favourite drinks.

Even with that, I've found this fall a challenge. There just seems to be so much negativity in the world. It's like no one is interested in conversation, compromise, and holding the middle for civilized discourse that doesn't descend into escalating degrees of rhetoric and screaming voices. The extremes of the "us" and "them" camps feel like they're growing increasingly militant and aggressive. I worry about what that means for us as a society, a community, a family. The war in Ukraine drudges on and even the military-industrial complex seems to be tiring of the obscene profits ...it's hard to find the silver lining. The anti-SOGI demonstrations were, regardless of what the organizers might say, hatefilled and, I think, fear-fuelled. When you're called garbage, dangerous, and predatorial...when you're told: "Our pastor prayed for the delusional gays" ... It's hard to find the silver lining. When our social empathy quotient seems to be at an all-time low and every other statement seems to be about placing blame in all the wrong places so we can ignore our privilege and our perpetual propping up of oppressive systems, or the perpetual jurisdictional shuffle ...it's hard to find the silver lining.



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One returned and gave thanks. Not ten, one. William Cutter wrote "Doth not each raindrop help to form the cool refreshing shower? And every ray of light to warm and beautify the flower?" It is hard to see the silver lining, yet maybe, like the one and like the raindrop and ray of light, you and I are called to spot the glimmers of hope and amplify them for ourselves and others as we walk in the way of Jesus because sometimes it's the little glimpses that give us the strength to keep working towards God's kin-dom right here in our midst and sometimes what we think is a raindrop might actually be a tsunami.



With the backdrop of utterly inappropriate comments by politicians on the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation, Wab Kinew becomes the first indigenous premier in Canada. Over 400 people gathered to proclaim SOGI's place in schools and the wonder of our identity, expression, and orientation diversity. The feeling of love, acceptance, belonging, and affirmation was palpable. In the midst of people not having clean drinking water, others are trying to figure out how to raise the money to change that. Harmony House is being built. Our community is growing. We're bringing people together. We're finding ways to deepen our relationship with the Holy and share that experience with others. We're spotting and naming hope. Sometimes all it takes is the one who spots the glimmer of hope and is thankful.

In our post-restriction world of inflation and increasing cost of living, it's hard to spot the silver lining and perhaps that's why it's so important that we do our best to embody the one who gives thanks, not because it's easy, but because it's desperately needed. As we join in worship and bring our harvest of fresh vegetables and fruit on Thanksgiving Sunday may each of us spot the raindrops of hope that fuel our thanksgiving and may we be a ray of light in someone else's life. Together may we be the ones who return and give thanks for all Creator has done and is doing in our lives and in the world.

Happy Thanksgiving.

The Finance Committee has been reviewing and tracking the church's finances all year and we are grateful for the congregation's continued financial support of the ministry and community programming that makes Trinity a positive influence in our community. Beyond our community, M&S contributions fund the United Church programs across the globe. During our ACM, the congregation committed to contribute more to M&S in 2023 than last year. We are well beyond what we would have expected at this time of year.

Overall, our regular offerings are slightly higher than budgeted and our other revenues have been good. However, we have expenditures that were not expected. As we all know, inflation has affected us all, and this includes the church operations. We have also had some unexpected facility repairs and our insurance increased more than expected due to our fires.

Another unexpected expense that will be coming up is the small roof repair of the "steeple" of the historic hall downtown.

At the end of August, we are about -5% of our revenues over expenses. We still have a few months till the end of the year and historically, the congregation's generosity has narrowed this gap by year end to make up the deficit.

Thank you for your support of the church and thanks to all our counters and Finance committee members.

We are also planning our annual Christmas Cookie sale for December. The Cookie Sale will be held on December 17th, which is the same date as the choir Cantata.

One of our members sends cards to those who are in need of a little extra support from Trinity.

The Fellowship ladies are also the ones who provide coffee, tea, and goodies after Worship on Sunday mornings. We also provide coffee & tea and assist with serving at the reception after a Memorial Service.

We meet the first Tuesday of every month at 7:00 p.m. in the Youth Room at the Church and new members are always welcome.

As you can see, we have a very busy fall planned. We are very grateful for your support of our fundraising activities. All funds raised go to support Trinity's various ministries in Prince George.

Looking Back:

We are very pleased with what we were able to start and accomplish last year. As a little reminder, last year we: worked toward improving the recycling system at Trinity's two buildings; planned and assisted with a contemplative church service; led a six-week video study titled Climate Change 101; organized the Trinity team for the Community Clean-up; providing seasonal "tips to live a little greener"; and, in June, invited Del Reinheimer to come and talk to us about how his family has reduced their household's carbon footprint. This last event was recorded and if you missed it, you can still watch it through a link on the Trinity website.

Looking Forward:

Some of the things we are planning for the coming year are: participating in the Season of Creation worship services; providing a "Pause for Creation" message during the second Sunday of the month church service; providing information and a forum for discussion on a bulletin board in the hall behind the sanctuary; hosting a panel discussion in early 2024 with some Trinity members who have some experience with new-ish electric vehicles; coordinating the Trinity team for the City clean-up in the spring of 2024; and, working on a project in remembrance of Barb Dean and her devotion to the care of creation.

We are looking for new members for our Team and new ideas from anyone wanting to share them with us! We have been meeting about once a month for 1-2 hours.

Our Autumn tips to care for creation: Get outside and take time to appreciate the beauty of this season: the magnificent yellows and reds of the tree and shrub leaves against the brilliant blue of the sky; the sights and sounds of the migrating and resident birds; and, time spent with family and friends enjoying the bounty of our gardens!

Think about the big and little actions you can take individually and collectively to reduce your carbon footprint and make positive impacts to the natural environment around you.

OUTREACH COMMITTEE—JUDY ADDIE

As Thanksgiving approaches, we are thankful that we have warm houses, beds to sleep in, and food on the table. We think of the vulnerable members of our community who are unhoused, who do not have adequate winter clothing, or who have food shortages.

We think of families who are struggling with the cost of school supplies and back to school clothing.

The Outreach Committee continues to serve those in need in our community. Thank you for the rain gear, umbrellas, and ponchos. More than 20 items were given out on a rainy morning in September. Thank you for the ball caps and sun hats that were received by guests at St. Vincent's. More than 120 hats were given away during the spring and summer months. The school supplies that you donated in August and September were delivered to our three partner schools. These extras helped to take the stress off parents who could not afford school supplies.

The Outreach Committee serves a soup and sandwich bag lunch to approximately 100 guests at St. Vincent de Paul's Drop in Centre on the second Sunday of each month. Many people help with shopping for groceries, buying bread, making soup, making sandwiches, and serving more than 100 guests in the afternoon. Speak to Vickie or Judy if you'd like to help, or just pop into the kitchen after church.

Some of our events in the coming months will be 'Drop the Gloves and Sock it to Me'. We will be asking for donations of NEW gloves and socks for adults and children. We will be collecting leftover Hallowe'en candy in November so that a treat can be added to lunch bags at St. Vincent's. Our big event is Shoebox Sunday when over 125 shoebox sized gifts are given to guests at the Soup Kitchen in December. You'll be hearing more in the upcoming weeks about these fall and winter events.

Thank you for your service whether it's your time, your money, or the items that you donate.





Food items appreciated are: pasta, canned fruit and vegetables, granola bars and protein foods such as canned beans, canned fish, canned meat, peanut butter.




