Even with all of that I don't think I've ever been naïve.

I mean how could you be naively hopeful in our world. If the evening news is part of God's plan...wow...really? Israel bombing Iran and potentially starting another generational conflict in the Middle East while continuing a path of aggression in Gaza that has been condemned by the World Council of Churches. Ukraine and Russia still can't find a path to peace and so the war trudges on and the only people benefiting from it are those selling the arms and reaping historic profits from suffering. "No King" protests have taken cities by storm in what is purported to be the greatest democracy in the world.

The G7 summit has at times descended into a trumptonian circus. Our own country is wrestling with if we really want our elbows to be up and if we do, does that mean we have to apologize for it and what about Albertan separatism? Even our denomination feels divided as we celebrate our centennial with the challenges and blessings that have been part of it. This summer at GC45 there are reports that say by 2035 there will be less than 140 full-time ministry positions and that congregations are struggling to meet existing financial commitments while there's also a proposal from the General Council Executive to increase the annual assessments (the tax paid to be part of The United Church of Canada). I can definitely say there are days when I really want the Psalmists refuge in and strength of God. There are definitely days when all I can say is, "I just don't get it!" Thankfully even in these troubled times our God is ever present and I'm part of an amazing community of faith!

There's no denying that this time and generation has its share of challenges, yet so did those who took the insanely courageous leap of faith by saying yes to church union in 1925. Just think about what the world was like at that moment in history. For Newfoundland a whole generation of its next leaders had died in one morning just a few years before union. The great depression was just four years away. The dirty thirties would be the context where the newly formed United Church would test its theological metal. World War II would be on the horizon soon enough and once again the world would be thrown into a war to end all wars. Canada was still expanding. There was challenge. Untold suffering and a growing separation between the haves and the have nots, yet there was also hope. Real hope. The kind that rolls up its sleeves and looks at the powers of tyranny and oppression and says, "come on. I dare you!" A hope that is part of our very DNA as disciples of Jesus who believe that the forces of evil in this world cannot blow out the light of faith that burns within each of us as disciples of Jesus. A hope that knows how to take risks and step out into the future, not because we can see exactly how it will turn out, but because we know that God will be there as we build resilient communities of deep spirituality, daring justice, and bold discipleship.

Lola Ridge is quoted as saying, "you are full of unshaped dreams. You are laden with beginnings...There is hope in you..." I believe that this is absolutely true for Trinity United. We are filled with unshaped dreams and laden with the potentiality of new beginnings as individuals and as a community of faith. That's who we are. We're literally the product of an unshaped dream that asked, "how can we be the most effective United Church presence in Prince George?" A dream of a safer space where everyone could be valued, included, loved, and affirmed. A dream of showing what an anti-racist community could look like. A dream where church could find its place back at the centre of community once again. A dream where partnerships

break down competitive isolationist thinking and instead build a mosaic of beautiful people created in the image of God made even stronger because of their differences. A dream that walks differently the pathway of reconciliation and healing, that is willing to own its history and admit its faults, to listen to hard truths, and own the benefit from our complicity. And none of this will be easy. It isn't supposed to be.

As spring turns to summer, I hope each of us will find moments to ground ourselves in those unshaped dreams and the hope that is in our community and the ever-present help of the Divine shown to us in Jesus. May the warmer summer nights, food growing on trees and in the earth, and the gathering of communities to celebrate milestones remind us, that even in a troubled world, God is good...all the time! Summer blessings.

As always, the role of the M&P committee is to provide confidential support for all of the church's paid staff and to act as a liaison, fostering the relationship between the staff and the congregation.


We were pleased to host a staff dinner to show our appreciation for all the great things they do for our ministry, on a daily basis, throughout the year (thank you Vicki for hosting).

CHOIR — ERICA SKOWRON


